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#### FOREWORD

This Manual was reprinted in 1980 with typing errors which had been incorporated in the original version corrected, but with no other alterations.

Readers should note that Volume 2, mentioned in the author's foreword of 1976, was not, in fact, published. Technical information on sampling, coding and data layout may be published at a later date; enquiries about this information should be directed to John Hall (Department of Applied Social Studies, Polytechnic of North London).

The SSRC Survey Unit was closed in 1976. Any queries about the Unit's publications should be addressed to the SSRC Information Office.

#### AUTHOR'S FOREWORD

The fieldwork for this survey was conducted for the SSRC Survey
Unit by Research Services Ltd between November 1973 and January
1974. Personal interviews with a preselected probability sample
of electors yielded 966 useful cases. It was the first main national
study following two pilot studies carried out in 1971, and is part
of an internal research programme to develop subjective social
indicators directed jointly by Mark Abrams and John Hall.

This manual is arranged as though it referred to a system-file generated by Statistical Package for the Social Sciences (SPSS). It is the basic master-file and is generated using the VARXXX TO VARyyy convention. From this master-file all derived variables necessary to a full analysis can be computed with the exception of some minor deviations of grouping from the raw data related to coding of occupations.

The arrangement of variables follows the questionnaire, and the order of data on the original punched cards is retained. The convention has been adopted of using the three digits in the variable name to refer to a card and column location in the original data. The first digit indicates the card number, and the second pair of digits indicates the beginning of a column-field on that card. Most variables are coded in single columns, but where more than one column was used the first column in the field is used for the variable name. The questionnaire has card and column allocations printed on it and this makes cross referencing much easier.

All technical information on sampling, coding and data layout will be published separately in Volume 2.





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Quality of Life in Urban Britain 1973 (short version)

The data in this special SPSS system file are taken from the 1973 Quality of Life Survey conducted by Mark Abrams and John Hall of the SSRC Survey Unit. The full data set is available via the SSRC Survey Archive of the University of Essex. This set is intended for small verions of SPSS (SPSS4G), and should interest students in most social science areas about to venture into computers and survey data for the first time. Users are recommended to read the articles in Social Trends, Nos. 4 and 7 (Abrams, 1973; Hall 1976).

Variables are referenced by their position in the original data set (e.g. 3 digits in VARname indicate card and column number of original variable). All codes marked '\*' are declared as MISSING in the file.

Users will need access to the full user manual (Hall et al., 1976) or the original questionnaire, for details of questions and methodology, and for variables not included in this subset.

The Survey was conducted by Research Services Ltd for the Survey Unit of the British Social Science Research Council (SSRC) between October and December 1973 with a probability sample of individuals drawn from the electoral register in England, Wales and Scotland south of the Caledonian Canal and excluding rural areas.

There are 966 cases in the file.

## Instructions to Interviewers

For each address you should:

- transfer the address details onto a Contact Sheet (ie. write in the Local Authority Area (L.A.A.), the constituency, the ward, the polling district, the area code, address serial number and the address itself) and add your name and interviewer number.
- write in also on the Contact Sheet the name specified on the Sample Issue Sheet as the person to be interviewed.

You must make not fewer than three calls at an address at different times of day to contact the named person and carry out the interview.

Record the dates, times and results of all calls in the space provided on the Contact Sheet. If, after three calls at an address you have still not made contact with the named person, the address may be classified as unproductive. We cannot accept substitute interviews in the event of non-contact with the named interviewee.

You may find in a few instances that the named person's household has moved away from the address you have been given. If the entire household has moved you should then select for the interview one member of the household now resident at the address. Select this person as follows:

- List the full names of all the members of the household aged 18 or more in the grid provided at the bottom left-hand side of the Contact Sheet.
- number them in alphabetical order: if two members of the household have identical names, that person whose birthday is nearest to the date of the interview should be given priority in the numbering.
- using the table at the bottom right-hand side of the Contact Sheet, select your person for interview. Count the number of household members listed, then select the appropriate column in the table. Run down this column until you come to the figure opposite the last digit of the address serial number. This is the number of the person to be interviewed.

Again we cannot accept substitute interviews in the event of noncontact with the selected interviewee.

NB. If only the named person is no longer at this address, but his/ her former household is still resident, you must <u>not</u> interview a substitute. The household should be classified as unproductive.

## SAMPLING DETAILS

The sample was designed to be representative of the adult population (18+) on the electoral roll, living in urban areas of Great Britain, excluding those North of the Caledonian Canal. It was a two stage sample which selected 50 polling districts at the first stage, and 28 named individuals in each polling district at the second.

An additional element of stratification was introduced at the first stage by the order in which the local authority areas were listed for the sampling frame. All Urban local authority areas, i.e. London boroughs, county boroughs, municipal boroughs and urban districts, were listed, stratified by:

- 1) Registrar General's Standard Region
- 2) Within each region by two area types:
  - conurbation
  - other urban
- 3) Within each area type:
  - conurbations were subdivided into high and low employment areas.

    High employment areas are those areas where the population employed in the area is greater than the economically active resident population, and low employment areas are those where it is less
  - urban areas were subdivided into those with an adult population of 75,000 or more, and those with less than 75,000
- 4) Within each of the resulting stratification cells, the areas were listed in descending order of social grade index, i.e. the areas were listed in descending order in relation to the proportion of their population who came in categories 1, 4, and 13 of the Registrar General's Socio-Economic Groups, the professional and managerial occupation groups.

Fifty local authority areas were then selected with probability proportional to total population using the following procedure:

- 1) The total of 50 areas was allocated between the regions as nearly as possible proportionally to the population of each region
- 2) Within each region cumulative population totals were formed for the local authority areas as listed above
- 3) A fixed sampling interval (= total population of the region ) was required no of sampling points calculated and used with a random starting point to select the required number of areas.

This number was used to select the polling district in which the elector was listed. We thus have one polling district within each of the 50 selected local authority areas.

Within each of these primary sampling units 28 electors were selected by a systematic selection with a random starting point. Subsequently, when the response rate proved lower than had been estimated, a further 5 electors were selected in the same way within each of the 50 polling districts.

For each person selected, the sampler recorded on a "Sample Issue Sheet" the full name and address of the selected individual.

## Substitute Interviews

A random number grid was used to select an informant aged 18 or over at addresses where the complete household of the originally named elector had moved away; but there was no substitute in any other case where the named elector was not available for interview.

## CODING APPENDIX

That there is a theoretical basis for the overall design of any survey, and for the choice and wording of questions, needs no stressing. But the same is also true for what is often represented as a purely technical stage of the survey - coding. The categories used to reduce the information available from respondents themselves (in pre-coded questions) or the questionnaires (in openended questions) to intellectually and technically workable variables are as much part of a theoretical process as any other element of the survey. The implications of this for analysis are spelt out in this extract from Hindess.

There is no correct and unique distribution that exists independently of its means of production, no distribution that is independent, in particular, of the system of categories into which the population is to be distributed.\*

It is important, for this reason, that the criteria for categorisation are recorded as precisely as possible. In addition, it is often necessary for genuinely technical reasons to know the coding procedures used, e.g. when altering a system file or when replicating questions. The coding instructions as used by the coders are given below and, used in conjunction with the questionnaire, give as full an account of the categories used as is possible here. If further detail is needed, the researcher must consult the notes given to the coders, which are available in the Survey Unit.

Note that, because the raw data set was quite complex involving alphapunches and multi-punches, the codes on many variables have been altered considerably in making the SPSS file; the recoding procedures are shown on the listing of the file-creation cards.

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## Fieldwork Results

Interviewing was carried out between 15th October 1973 and 11th January 1974 for the National sample and for the Stoke and Sunderland surveys between 15th November 1973 and 16th February 1974.

The questionnaire was supplied by the Social Science Researc-Council Survey Unit but modified to the Research Services house style.

Fully trained women interviewers were used on the survey and a very high standard of accuracy and reliability was set. This was maintained by a comprehensive editing procedure and constant supervision. Every questionnaire failing to come up to the standard required by reason of omissions or inconsistencies was rejected.

The figures given below show the fieldwork results for the period covered by the report. The following explanation of some of the terms used may be helpful.

"Away" means that the interviewer found that the person be interviewed would be away from home for the who of the interviewing period in that area.

#### 'Out; 3 or more calls'

means that the person to be interviewed was known be 'in residence' but was out on each of the three or more occasions that the interviewer called.

'Refused' includes all refusals both by and on behalf of the person to be interviewed. These include refusals on behalf of that person on the grounds of illness.

#### 'Interview not possible'

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means that the person to be interviewed was incapable of giving a satisfactory interview because of sickness, infirmity, deafness, inability to speak English or other such incapacity.
