

John F Hall, born 1940, read Classics, later Social Anthropology, Gonville and Caius College, Cambridge, graduated 1963. Diploma in Education, Durham Univ 1964. Taught English and Liberal Studies at Openshaw Technical College, Manchester, for one year, then worked for 3 years on the Work and Home survey at Salford Univ. Two years lecturing on Social Research Methods in the postgraduate Department of Transportation and Environmental Planning was followed by six years with the Social Science Research Council Survey Unit where he was responsible with Mark Abrams for the British Quality of Life Surveys. Author of one of the earliest British survey analysis programs (for English Electric KDF-9) he has always been active on the computing and quantitative front. Secretary of the Study Group on Computers in Survey Analysis from 71-73 and latterly Chairman of the UK SPSS Users Group (UKSUG) he organised the final design conference for SCSS at LSE in 1974. Editor of the Quantitative Sociology Newsletter and UKSUG Newsletter he is convenor of the British Sociological Association Survey Research Group and the British member of the Board of Directors of Research Committee 33 (Logic and Methodology) of the International Sociological Association. He is an active member of the Market Research Society and the BSA, having served on a number of committees and organised several conferences in the area of social research or computing. When the SSRC Survey Unit closed in 1976, he went to the Polytechnic of North London as Principal Lecturer in Sociology and Head of the Social Research and Planning option of a revolutionary new 4-year degree in Applied Social Studies. He is also Director of the Survey Research Unit at the Polytechnic which has taken over most of the functions of the old SSRC unit and runs specialist postgraduate courses in survey methods, computing and statistics for social researchers, as well as an annual North London Area Survey.
