Depth interview guide

HOUSEHOLD/FAMILY

- Household composition
- Age/sex/employment status of household members
- History of separation/widowhood (where relevant)
- Other children/family members in area
- Tenure
- Residence at address/in area

CHARACTERISTICS/CIRCUMSTANCES OF THE HANDICAPPED PERSON

- Age/sex
- Position in family (if other children)
- Day time activity
- Type/severity of handicap
- History of handicap
- Accompanying physical disibilities
- Behavioural problems

HISTORY OF RESIDENCE AT HOME

- Detailed history of mentally handicapped person living at home; reasons for any changes; feelings about changes.
- Reason for decision to live at home
 - in childhood/at outset of handicap
 - when left school/in adulthood

EXPERIENCE OF OTHER FORMS OF CARE

- Details of other forms of care used; when; for how long; what type.
- Views about other types of care experienced; aspects approved/disapproved

KNOWLEDGE/AWARENESS OF OTHER FORMS OF CARE

- Knowledge of local provision; sources of information; contact with/visits to; how initiated; views about.
- Knowledge/awareness of alternatives available outside area; sources of information; views about
- Awareness of different forms of care (promted where necessary); views about.

6. INDEPENDENCE/ABILITIES OF HANDICAPPED PERSON

- Brief check of abilities/needs/social skills; degree to which independent; level of help required.
- · Feelings about level of independence/dependency
- Whether had training in self care/daily activities/ social skills; when; who provided; how responded.
- Whether parents have tried to encourage greater independence; (i.ė. through extending daily activities; clubs; holidays; encouraging greater separation).
- Views about further training/preparation; potential for greater independence.

EXPECTATIONS FOR MENTALLY HANDICAPPED PERSON IN ADULTHOOD (Reference to time when son/daughter in late teens/ early twenties).

- What expectations did they have for son/daughter in relation to
 - day time activities
 - social activities
 - where they would live
- To what extent did they think about handicapped person 'leaving home' like other children of his/her age; did they think about it; when
- To what extent did they explore/think about other possibilities at that time; what; what happened.
- What are the factors that made it 'different' for handicapped son/daughter: than for other children
- Why do they feel it is more difficult to see handicapped person move on;
 IF OTHER CHILDREN WHO HAVE LEFT HOME
 How did they feel when other children left home; did this raise any feelings about son/daughter staying or leaving home.

8. FEELINGS ABOUT SEPARATION FROM HANDICAPPED PERSON

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- To what extent have they seen separated from their handicapped son/daughter: reference to previous mention of care; holidays; staying with relatives etc.
- Were there any problems/ difficulties for son/ daughter/for them while away.
- How did they feel when son/daughter went away;
 while he/she was away; when they came back.

9. VIEWS/FEELINGS ABOUT HOME CARE

- What have been the rewards/stress of caring at home:
 - in the past
 - at present
- What have been the effects of home care on
 - the handicapped person
 - the parents
 - other children
- To what extent have other family members (outside household) been involved; how do they feel about that.
- To what extent have they received help/support from service agencies/self-help groups.
- Have there been times when 'decision' to care at home was in question/times when it was too much; when; what happened; how did they feel; what kept them going.
- Are there any circumstances/alternatives that might have changed decision to care at home: what, why.

CONSIDERATION OF ALTERNATIVES

- Tô what extent have they considered their son/ daughter living elsewhere; in past; at present: reasons; when.
- Have they explored any other options at all; with other relatives/friends; with formal agencies; self-help groups.
- What sort of alternatives are they looking for/ thinking about; what are the <u>essential</u> features; important features.
- What do they feel when question of son/daughter living elsewhere is raised.
- Do they know of other mentally handicapped people who have moved from home; who; what happened; how did they feel.

11. CONSIDERATION OF/PROVISION FOR FUTURE

- Extent to which future has been considered; what has been considered; feelings about.
- Specific plans/provision made; what; when; why; feelings about.
- Hopes for future; what arrangements they would want
- Difficulties of thinking about the future; ways in which might be helped.

12. VIEWS ON PROVISION NEEDED

- Do they have any thoughts about the kinds of provision that are needed; what; what features are important.
- Are there ways in which parents could be helped to plan for the future; mentally handicapped people could be helped to prepare for the future
- If a suitable alternative had existed would they still prefer to care for their son/daughter at home or would they like them to have opportunity of living elsewhere; what would be suitable.
- General views on help/services needed for parents caring for adults at home.
